

Philosophy of the campaign “Respect can change our lives”

The word respect comes from the Latin word “respectus”, which means: regard, consideration

We can consider respect in two situations:

From the personal point of view, respect of oneself is the feeling one has of his/her own worth, reflecting it in the manner he or she shows care for himself or herself and for the manner he or she presents himself or herself to others. It is a quality that should be developed.

In a community, respect is at the core of the sense of **esteem for others**. Showing respect is showing one is conscious of mutual enrichment while being different from each other. Human cohesion creates synergies that entails progress together.
